As a proud alumnus of the Graduate School at the College of Charleston and as an individual whose life was immeasurably changed by my experience there, I'm writing to express my support of the College of Charleston's application for a FOREVER stamp in 2020, commemorating the institutions 250th anniversary.

Even as a graduate student, I was incredibly involved on campus.
